

(Connecting through Literacy: Incarcerated Parents, their Children and Caregivers)



CLICC is a book club for incarcerated parents and their children in Connecticut.



How CLICC Works

CLICC is a book club for incarcerated parents and their children in Connecticut.

• Each child picks 6 books from the Scholastic book catalogue.

- The child meets with a trained, supportive mentor for one hour, once a week, for an entire year to read the books and write letters to Mom or Dad.
- Mom or Dad receives the same books and does similar activities while incarcerated with help from a different CLICC mentor, who also assists with parenting and postrelease planning.
- The mentor continues to meet with Mom or Dad, for 6 months postrelease.

How do I join CLICC?

Families must meet these conditions:

• The parent is between 6 months and 3 years of release from a Connecticut state prison that offers CLICC.

- The child is between 5 and 17 years old, lives in Connecticut, knows the parent is incarcerated, and wants to participate.
- The caregiver agrees to child's participation.



Getting started

- •Parent fills out a CLICC application and returns it to a DOC counselor.
- CLICC contacts and has introductory meeting with the caregiver and child.
- The child selects fun books to read from the book catalogue.
- CLICC orders the books and matches the child with a trained, caring mentor.

Everything is free!



Services for Families

CLICC has a grant from CTCIP to offer the CLICC mentoring program, along with these services for families:

- Referrals to counseling
- Coaching and support for talking with the child about the parent's incarceration
- Information about prison visits and phone calls
- Invitations to special family events, such as CLICC literacy fairs
- Support group for caregivers
- "Welcome home" pizza parties to celebrate parents' return.
